out of **877** regulated members responded to the survey.

## **Improvement** Opportunities

### What we heard:



The CCP and Renewal Forms could be made clearer and more user-friendly.



Complete a comprehensive review of all form instructions and update them to make the forms easier to understand.

How we are going to address it:



Feedback on the requirement of goals and reflections in the CCP Form was split - some respondents felt they add value and others did not.



The Competency Committee will review the value of goals and reflections to the CCP.



Subject matter that is eligible for CCP credits is unclear.



Make Alberta competency requirements clear to members through the development of a competencies document and clear information on our website.



There is confusion between the role of an association vs the role of a College.



Develop a communications strategy to educate members on the differences between these entities<sup>1</sup>.



There were some common misconceptions regarding registration renewal and the CCP.



Inform members of the facts in order to reduce these misconceptions<sup>2</sup>.

The College is required to have a CCP pursuant to the *Health Professions Act* to ensure public safety. The College also runs a CCP for a variety of other benefits it brings to the profession<sup>1</sup>.

**3.** The CCP Form should be available on our member portal all year long so members can track their progress.

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**4.** A member should be able to edit their goal if it changes throughout the year.



The goal section of the CCP Form can be edited, meaning **members can update or change their goals at any time**.

**5.** Unsure what the College does and how its funds are spent.

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The College uses funds to fulfill its mandate to protect the public. We will produce a *What the College Does* video to **inform stakeholders about the work we do and the role we play in the acupuncture profession**.

# **College and Association Functions**

	College	Association
Membership	Mandatory	Voluntary
Accountability	Accountable to the government. (in our case, Minister of Health)	Accountable to its members.
Primary Goal	Achieve mandate to protect the public.	Act in the best interest of its members and advocate on behalf of the profession they represent.
Legislative compliance	Govern regulated members according to legislation and bylaws.	No regulatory authority.
Competence	Sets the standards for competence requirements. Required to run a continuing competence program.	Free to offer professional development opportunities to support their members in their pursuit of competent and ethical practice.
Ethics	Sets the standards for ethical practice. Authorized to receive complaints from the public of alleged unprofessional conduct against regulated members, and can take disciplinary action when necessary.	
Protected title	Only entity that can authorize the use of a protected title. (in our profession, there is one protected title - Doctor of Acupuncture)	Cannot authorize use of a protected title/credentials.
Advocacy	Not permitted to advocate for the profession.	Free to focus on advocacy and promotion of the profession, including such issues as public awareness and professional image.
